From the Desk of Rev. Diana

Many of you know I was on a fabu-

lous retreat on Iona Island in Scotland with John Philip Newell right before I started at Holy Nativity. John Philip often refers to God's beautiful creation as the Cathedral of Earth, Sky and Sea. There is something deep within us that stirs when are out in nature, something that recognizes the Holy, the Sacred. Where have you encountered the sacred in nature? A sunset, a Fall tree, a walk along the beach, climbing a mountain? Often people will say that they find God in nature. This makes perfect sense. God created all of the universe and It is Good! There is somehow we just know in the depths of our being that the earth is sacred, and that this sacredness is at the heart of every human being and life-form. John Philip writes" The problem is that we live in ways that neglect this deep knowing. Thus, the crises that we are in the midst of today, whether ecological, political or societal, stem from the fact that we treat the earth and each other as less than sacred. All these critical issues are interrelated. The way we have wronged the earth and one another is the way we have dishonored the feminine or belittled the "other," whether that is the 'other" nation, religion, race, or sexual orientation. We have fallen out of alignment with the deepest truths within us. How are we to awaken again to the sacredness at the heart of all life, the sacredness that is also at the heart of our own being?" How do we begin to change the way we see each other and our world so that we can see the precious sacredness and holiness of everyone we meet. We cannot reverse the injustice, pain, and suffering to people and the earth that has resulted from

And there is a realization that we must nurture a new reverence for the earth if the world as we know it is to survive. In one of my earlier Warden's reports, I reflected on the changes at the meadow at Legion Field from season to season. I mentioned him because I shared some insights into his life during my message on Father's Day, June 18th. I was blessed to be able to lead Morning Prayer that day. I am blessed also at the rejuvenation at Holy Nativity, in no small part due to the arrival of Rev. Diana.

The first Saturday suppers have continued to draw in new visitors to the parish and attendance at the Tuesday Eucharist and lunch has been well attended and growing in number. The Tuesday Eucharist is continuing through the summer as is our Adult Christian Education program.

Looking forward to Rev. Diana's celebration of a new ministry with Bishop Gates in September which should be an exciting time. I want to thank my co-warden, Ron Russo, for all the time he has put in assessing the needs of our physical plant and scheduling contractor visits etc.

Many of you know my love of music and as I was listening to some 60's rock and roll songs that by now I have heard countless times, I begin to think about the first time I heard a particular song and how it and thousands of others have been etched in my memory. I realized it's by hearing them repeatedly until they almost become part of me. This got me thinking about a New Year's resolution I made the beginning of 2023 which was to read the entire bible in a year. I began on January 1st. One of the resources I use for daily devotions lists the books and chapters for a given day and I am now into the Book of Isaiah. So far, especially in Psalms, I have come across chapters and verses which are more familiar than others. So, my epiphany is, just as the love music has been a large part of who I am by repeated listening I need to do the same with the Word of God. Reading the Bible from Genesis to Revelations in a year is a good start and by reading Morning Prayer and Compline daily I hope to be able to really hear and inwardly digest all that God has to say. Again, I am blessed to serve as your warden here at Holy Nativity.

I leave you with this from Paul's letter to the Colossians:

A Letter from our Bishops

This week in 2015, in its landmark *Obergefell* ruling, the Supreme Court established fundamental marriage equality for LGBTQ persons throughout the nation. We greeted that decision with joy, recognizing as it did that equal treatment under the law is not only a democratic principle, but also one that recognizes the inherent, God-given goodness of every human being, and supports societal structures which enshrine our communal recognition of that goodness.

Eight years later the current Supreme Court has issued a ruling which could legitimize the false notion that First Amendment rights allow religious conviction to be cited as an excuse for unequal treatment under the law and the failure to protect those who may be vulnerable to bigotry or hatred. Any ostensible religious conviction used to enshrine inequality or injustice is antithetical to the Christian Gospel, and to our baptismal covenant to respect the dignity of every human being.

This ruling comes at a time when a tidal wave of anti-LGBTQ legislative efforts have been introduced across the country, threatening protections for LGBTQ persons and causing fear among many, including our own church members, family members and siblings of every sort. Meanwhile, schools and libraries confront nationwide efforts to ban books and restrict the honest facing of our nation's history in matters of race and justice. Here we are reminded of the prophet Jeremiah, who proclaimed, "They have treated the wound of my people carelessly, saying 'Peace, Peace,' when there is no peace." [6:14]

We wish, in this moment, to declare ourselves and our diocese fully committed to the fullest inclusion, protection and celebration of all children of God, and to advocate tirelessly for the same not only in our houses of worship, but in our communities and our nation.

We join with Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, who <u>affirmed this week</u>: "This may feel like a moment of difficulty and darkness, and it is. And yet the work goes on. ... I believe deep in my soul that God is always seeking to create a world and a society where all are loved, where justice is done, and where the God-given equality of us all is honored in our relationships, in our social arrangements, and in law."

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The Common Cup

Recently, both the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and the World Health Organization declared an end to the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. COVID-19 is now classified as an established and ongoing public health concern. Vaccines and booster shots are widely available, our medical care system can respond to local surges and hospitalizations and deaths have declined significantly. In March of 2022 the Diocese of Massachusetts gave us permission to resume the use of the common cup. The consensus of the CDC is that a theoretic risk of transmitting infectious diseases by using a common communion cup exists, but that the risk is so small that it is undetectable—you are far more likely to catch something by shaking someone's hand than by drinking from the common cup.

As we continue to reemerge from our Pandemic practices there have been a number of requests to return to the common cup. I realize that many are still nervous about this practice. Starting in August wine will be distributed by both individual cups and the common cup. You may take a small cup from the tray, or you may wait for the common cup. Intinction or dipping of the bread is not permitted in the common cup. If you wish to intict, please take a small cup to intict and place the cup and any unused wine in the bowl provided by the staircase. Please reach out to Rev. Diana with any questions or concerns.

One bread, one body, one Lord of all, one cup of blessing which we bless; and we, though many, throughout the Earth, we are one body in this one Lord.



Roasted Clams with Lemony Panko

- 3/4 c. panko
- 4 tbsp. olive oil, divided
- 4 cloves garlic, finely grated & divided
- Kosher salt
- 1/2 c. dry white wine
- 1/2 tsp. red pepper flakes
- 3 dozen littleneck clams, scrubbed
- 1/3 c. flat-leaf parsley, chopped
- 1 tbsp. lemon zest plus 3 Tbsp lemon juice
- 1. **Step 1**Heat oven to 400°F. On small rimmed baking sheet, massage together panko, 2 tablespoons olive oil, one-fourth of garlic, and a pinch of salt.
- 2. **Step 2**In 9- by 13-inch baking dish, mix wine, red pepper flakes, remaining garlic, and 1 tablespoon oil with clams.
- 3. **Step 3**Transfer both pans to oven; bake, tossing panko once, until golden brown, 8 to 10 minutes. Remove panko, increase oven temperature to 475°F and roast until clams open, 8 to 10 minutes; discard any unopened clams. Toss panko with parsley and lemon zest. Pour lemon juice over clams, drizzle with remaining tablespoon oil and sprinkle with half of lemony panko. Serve with remaining panko.
